HC175/18 Deputation - #WeALLBelong Campaign- Peace IV Programme

The Chair invited Mr Carl Whyte, to make his presentation to the committee.

Mr Whyte proceeded with his presentation, highlighting the following:

- The project was a PEACE IV Cohesive Neighbourhoods Minority Inclusion initiative
- It includes the Beyond Tokenism Initiative with Foyle Racial Equality Forum
- The Anti-prejudice Public Campaign will focus on; Sectarianism, Racism, Homophobia, Transphobia and other Hate Crime categories
- There has been community engagement with the Foyle Race Equality Forum since April 2018
- It is planned to have a social media campaign, conventional advertising campaign, ongoing community engagement and the production of an educational resource
- A series of events are planned between now and 2020 to include a political pledge from all public representatives
- Events include; a short film entitled We All Belong in Derry and Strabane, a United Nations Day on 24 October and International Day of Persons and Disabilities on 3 December

The Chair thanked Mr Whyte for his presentation and invited Members to comment.

Alderman Hussey thanked Mr Whyte for his presentation and suggested that the title of the short film should include be entitled We All Belong in Derry/Londonderry and Strabane to recognise the diversity within the Council area.

Mr Whyte agreed that Londonderry should be included in the film title and all planned advertising for the initiative.

Councillor Gardiner thanked Mr Whyte for his presentation. She welcomed that the initiative was 'for something' regarding prejudice and hate crime. She stated that it was easy for people to fall 'off the radar' by omission and referred to the change of route at this year's St Patrick's Day parade which resulted in disabled people not being able to participate in the event. She suggested that local schools be included in the initiative and that inclusion officers attend committee meetings to ensure that the views of the minority were represented.

Mr Whyte stated that 'We All Belong' invited engagement at all levels. He added that the educational resources in the initiative included introducing the programme to post primary schools.

Alderman R Hamilton stated that there were children and young people in post primary, colleges and university who had suffered bullying due to racism, homophobic and sectarian issues which must be stopped.

Councillor Gallagher referred to the political pledge required from Members. He recalled that MLA's had gathered to make a political pledge to stop the implementation of budget cuts, however they had been put into effect shortly afterwards.

Councillor McCauley welcomed the initiative and stated that it was important that people work with and for each other to provide a uniformed front. He stated that he was eager as a Councillor and as a youth practitioner to see the programme being implemented.

Mr Whyte thanked the Members for the comments. He stated that Derry City and Strabane District Council were the first to engage in such an initiative and was impressed by the level of engagement and the cognisance of the issues by all groups.

HC176/18 Update on Brandywell Stadium Renaming Consultation

The Lead Democratic Services and Improvement Officer provided Members with a presentation which contained

the results of the consultation regarding the renaming of the Brandywell Stadium and sought Members views on and approval for the recommendation regarding the renaming of the Brandywell Stadium.

She reminded Members of the consultation namely whether or not they believed the Brandywell Football Stadium be changed to the Ryan McBride Brandywell Stadium and noted that the consultation process ran from the week beginning 9 April 2018 – 1 July 2018.

The Lead Democratic Services and Improvement Officer then highlighted the following points:

The total responses received were as follows:

- Total 6775
- Electronic votes 6019
- Written responses 756

Source of the responses:

- 16.0% of responses were from the BT47 postcode area
- 63.6% of responses were from the BT48 postcode area
- 4.6% of responses were from the BT82 postcode area
- 15.0% of the responses were from outside the Council area and included locations such as Northern Ireland, Republic of Ireland, Spain, Croatia, Australia and the USA
- 0.8% had incomplete postcodes

Overarching Themes within the consultation process:

The Lead Democratic Services and Improvement Officer outlined the pilot policy requirements for the consultations. She stated that a minimum return of 500 responses was required and that *'a threshold of two thirds of respondents to the consultation exercise in support of the naming proposals will be required to progress the adoption of a name for a Council asset'* (para 4.7.2)

She concluded by informing Members of the overall results which were as follows:

- For 4678 (71%)
- Against 1871 (29%)
- Total 6549.

The Chair thanked the Lead Democratic Services and Improvement Officer for the presentation and advised the Committee that the recommendation within the report was subject to Members' comments.

Councillor Campbell thanked the Lead Democratic Services and Improvement Officer (LDSIO) and the team on all the hard work undertaken throughout the 12 week consultation period. He stated that it was a fitting tribute to Ryan McBride who had grown up in the shadow of the Stadium at the Brandywell and had become a great ambassador for football. He commented on the Ryan McBride Soccer Day that had taken place during the Feile in the Brandywell whereby hundreds of children had taken part. He endorsed the recommendation on the report and looked forward to awaiting it's ratification at full Council.

Councillor Reilly thanked the LDSIO and her team on their work. He stated that the process had allowed people to have their say and that over 6000 people took their time

to have their say on such an important issue. He stated that Ryan McBride was an inspirational character and the overwhelming result in favour was a testament to this. He stated that he looked forward to seeing the recommendation progressed as soon as possible. He proposed that officers compile a report on how the wishes of the people be implemented.

Councillor Tierney stated that he was happy to also endorse the recommendation.

An expression of gratitude was extended to the Lead Democratic Services and Improvement Officer and the team by all Members of the Committee and members of the working group. They stated that it was evident that the people had engaged in the process and had made their voices known.

The Director of Health and Community stated that a further report will be compiled on how the naming proposal would be progressed.

The Committee

HC178/18 Confirmation of the Open Minutes of the Health and Community Committee held on Thursday 19 July 2018

The open Minutes of the Meeting held on 19 July 2018 (HC146/18 –HC165/87) were confirmed and signed by the Chairperson as correct.

HC179/18 Matters Arising

There were no matters arising.

HC180/18 Update on Community Centre Development including Top of the Hill, Lincoln Courts, Shantallow, Galliagh, Culmore, Ballymagroarty/Hazelbank, Brandywell/Daisyfields.

The Director of Health and Community presented the above report to update Members on the progress and current status of the Community Centre Capital Development Programme.

The Director then invited Mr Fergal McNicholl, Project Manager and Ms Sharon McCullagh, Department for Communities to provide an update to Members.

Mr McNicholl then proceeded to update Members on progress and the current status of the Community Centre Capital Project highlighting the following:

- Top of the Hill Community Centre with indicative costs of £2.3m and will incorporate a youth centre, parent and toddler group, office space and a small social hall.
- Lincoln Courts Community Centre with indicative costs of £700,000 and has been re-released to Tender.
- Shantallow Community Centre with indicative costs of £2.4m. Centre will incorporate a sports hall, office and training space, gymnasium, minor hall and computer suite. Technical design has commenced and planning approval granted.
- Galliagh Community Centre with indicative costs of £1.5m. Planning application has been submitted for approval on 3 October 2018. It is hoped the tender stage will be completed by April 2019 for construction to commence.
- Culmore Community Centre with indicative costs of £1.8m. Centre will incorporate office space with 4 block changing area and moderate size hall.
- Ballymagroarty/Hazelbank Community Centre – Surestart have an existing facility on the site and the preferred option is that they amalgamate with the new centre. DfC are engaging with WHSCT on the matter.

- Brandywell/Daisyfield Sports Centre with indicative costs of £4.1m. Centre will house Oakleaf Boxing Club and Over the Hill Snooker Club as well as 2 pitches and a 4 block changing area.

Councillor P Kelly thanked Mr McNicholl for his presentation. He stated that Councillors from the Derry area must be delighted with the plans to build or replace community centres throughout the city with indicative costs at approximately £14.6m. However, no funding was being used for facilities in the Strabane area. He enquired if there were any plans for Strabane as the ratepayers were also part of the Council area.

Alderman McClintock thanked the representatives on the very ambitious plans for the area. She noted that some of the plans were for new builds as well as replacement centres. She referred to Lincoln Courts Community Centre which was required to close during the process and asked if there was any assistance available during relocation as it would have implications for them and other groups.

In response, the Director of Health and Community stated that each project was taken on an individual site by site basis. She stated that they were aware of the impact on groups and were looking at ways of supporting them.

Alderman Hussey stated that he understood the issue of critical population mass to decide where buildings were sited, however there were concerns regarding community centre type provision compared to leisure centre provision. He asked if there were any plans for the development of community centre provision within areas such as Newtown Stewart and Sion Mills.

In response, the Director of Health and Community stated that the project was one strand of a very significant overall capital programme which included leisure centres and sports pitches, parks and a range of other facilities. She further stated that the projects presented were part of the Community Centre Review Strategy for both Council areas and subsequently tied into an overall development programme and the agreed works within

that strategic programme. She added that the programme would be open for review and development going forward and would be complemented by the Community Hub Programme that provided smaller scale delivery through the LAG Rural Development Fund and investments made by external organisations that required provision for child care and community group facilities.

Alderman Hussey requested that Members receive the overall programme for the district in order to compare the City with the remainder of the district area.

In response, the Director of Health and Community agreed to furnish Members with the information. She stated provision made since the formation of the new Council had included smaller scale facilities at Victoria Bridge and Glebe and more recently, Plumbridge.

Councillor Tierney thanked the Director for the update and stated that the majority of the projects had commenced under the Legacy Council. He referred to the plans for Shantallow and Culmore Community Centres and asked if funding was available for those particular projects. He stated that obtaining funding for Culmore was an issue as it was outside the Neighbourhood Renewal Area. He enquired if the absence of a functioning government at Stormont had any implications for the projects.

In response, Ms McCullagh stated that they were awaiting economic appraisal for Shantallow Community Centre and that the budget could not be approved until the business case was in place. She stated that from a budget perspective, they were competing with other business areas within their Department which was part of a significant capital programme. She outlined that if there were any constraints to a project, it would subsequently be delayed until the next financial year. She added that all projects were considered on their own merit. With regard to Culmore Community Centre, Ms McCullagh stated that it was outside the DfC budget remit. She further stated that regarding ministerial approval, these projects were considered under normal business to be

progressed within the Department for economic appraisal.

Councillor Gallagher referred to comments regarding the lack of provision for the Strabane area. He stated that there were a number of community centres throughout the Strabane and rural areas. He outlined that an evidence of need was required by community development officers and that none had been brought forward. He suggested that Members consider the services the existing community centres provide in their areas and identify whether any further evidence of need exists

Councillor Donnelly stated that the plans were encouraging as the centres were badly needed particularly in the Brandywell area. He further stated that in his opinion, a significant section of the community felt excluded from using such facilities due to political involvement.

Councillor Campbell welcomed the presentation and concurred with Councillor Tierney that a number of the projects had commenced with the Legacy Council.

The Chair thanked the representatives for their update.

Recommended

HC181/18 Neighbourhood Renewal Active Citizenship through Sport 2018-19 Update

The Leisure and Sports Services Manager presented the above report, previously circulated to Members. The purpose of the report was to seek Members' approval of the delivery of the Neighbourhood Renewal Active Citizenship through Sport Project and associated budgets.

Councillor Cusack welcomed and endorsed the recommendations within the report. She stated that everyone was aware of the direct link between physical activity and mental and physical health and wellbeing. She stated that gym and leisure facilities could be financially prohibitive for people wanting to become active and this project would enable them to promote mental and physical health. She noted that the project was rolled out in Neighbourhood Renewal areas and suggested that those responsible for the delivery of the project be made aware of the wider residential communities.

Alderman Hussey concurred with the comments made by Councillor Cusack and stated that the Neighbourhood Renewal Programme did not cover Strabane much less the wider rural areas. He stated that although he welcomed the project he hoped it would reach to the broader areas adjacent to all of the Neighbourhood Renewal Areas which would also benefit.

The Committee

Recommended that Members (i) approve the delivery of the Neighbourhood Renewal Active Citizenship through Sport Project and (ii) approve the issue of Service Level Agreements through the named organisations within each of the Neighbourhood Renewal Areas with associated budgets.

HC182/18 Consultation Response on Draft Food Law Code of Practice 2018

The Head of Health and Community Wellbeing presented the above report, which had been previously circulated to Members. The purpose of the report was to advise Members on the Food Standard Agency (FSA) of Northern Ireland consultation on the proposed amendments to the Food Law Code of Practice (Northern Ireland) 2018.

Councillor Gardiner thanked officers for all the work involved on the proposed amendments. She asked for clarity on the new proposed rating.

The Head of Health and Community Wellbeing stated that the proposal if businesses were consistently good in terms of hygiene, safety or management, they would be rewarded by reducing the frequency of inspections. He added that a similar approach was proposed in England and Wales.

Councillor Gardiner asked that if the frequency of visits by Environmental Health Officers decreased would that have an impact on the Food Hygiene Rating Scheme.

In response, the Head of Health and Community Wellbeing stated that not all businesses are part of the Food Hygiene Rating Scheme. He outlined that the pilot may result in a reduced frequency of inspections though the Food Hygiene ratings were unlikely to be impacted. The overall aim is to reduce the administrative burden on businesses. He added that the scheme would also assist the Food Standards Agency extract data on operating businesses from an online platform.

The Committee

Recommended that Members endorse the draft response on the proposed amendments to the Food Law Code of Practice (Northern Ireland) 2018.

HC183/18 Update on the Affordable Warmth Scheme Service Level Agreement 2018 - 19

The Head of Health and Community Wellbeing presented the above report, which had been previously circulated to Members. The purpose of the report was to seek Members' approval of the Service Level Agreement (SLA) with the Department for Communities (DfC) for the delivery of the Affordable

Warmth Scheme and the associated funding for 2018/19 financial year.

Councillor Cusack welcomed the report and stated that the additional funding would assist many families and households who availed of the scheme particularly in the winter months. She further stated that it would also provide some job security to employees working within the scheme. She requested clarity on the request by DfC to increase the number of referrals and noted that the funding amount would remain the same.

In response, the Head of Health and Community Wellbeing stated the referrals related to DfC and the capacity within the Northern Ireland Housing Executive (NIHE) to progress referrals. He stated that concerns had been raised regarding the overall demand across the eleven council areas and that the Affordable Warmth Task and Finish Working Group set up by Council will examine the delivery of the scheme.

Alderman Thompson welcomed the additional funding and enquired if Derry City and Strabane District Council were meeting the targets for the area.

In response, the Head of Health and Community Wellbeing stated that Ulster University had provided the postcodes and addresses of properties to be targeted in the scheme. He stated that Council can consider urgent cases had also been added and that although there was an extensive waiting list, monthly targets were being achieved. He stated that there were approximately 1,000 applicants on the waiting list though 188 of these properties are on the target address list.

Councillor Gallagher stated that a major difficulty within the scheme was that the funding was being allocated in small amounts at a time. He stated that there were a lot of people on the waiting list, however with the funding being awarded in such a way made the scheme difficult to administer.

Councillor Donnelly commented that the scheme was worthwhile and beneficial to those in need. He referred

to people who were in receipt of the Disability Living Allowance which had been taken into account as a qualifying income when applying for the scheme. He stated that in his belief, it was a form of discrimination which should be taken under consideration by the Affordable Warmth Task and Finish Working Group. He stated that he had also been contacted by an elderly constituent who had her boiler replaced under the scheme which had resulted in her house becoming badly water damaged due to a leakage from unsuitable pipes. He stated that he had contacted all of the relevant agencies involved, however none were prepared to take responsibility on the matter.

Alderman Hussey also welcomed the additional funding, however he expressed concerns regarding the costs compared to referrals. He stated that the DfC had not considered the expected increased referrals. He outlined that pro-rata there was a reduction of 35-40% within the scheme compared to the number of referrals. He added that although he welcomed the continuation of the scheme, he was concerned that the DfC had not increased the funding to match the expectations in referrals.

The Committee

Recommended **that Members (i) note the correspondence from DfC in relation to funding the Affordable Warmth Scheme during 2018/19 and (ii) recommends that Council resolves to sign the Service Level Agreement with the Department for Communities and notes the funding that will be provided to Council in respect of the costs incurred through the implementation of the Affordable Warmth Scheme.**

Councillor P Kelly requested an update regarding the provision of CCTV in Strabane Town. He stated that in light of a serious incident which recently occurred in the town, CCTV could have assisted the PSNI to identify those involved.

The Director of Health and Community reported that the application for CCTV in Strabane Town was under consideration by the Department for Communities and it was hoped to have an outcome in the near future which, in effect would provide match funding for the scheme. She outlined that the identification of location for the cameras in the town was ongoing and a number of properties had been approached for approval. She stated that a detailed report would be provided at the

October meeting of the Health and Community Committee.
